Gender role was the only variable to have a significant effect on measures of trait anger. Participants with a masculine gender role identity scored higher in trait anger and had a greater tendency to express anger outwardly whilst feminine participants had lower scores in trait anger and exercised greater control than masculine participants.

Gender role conflict is defined as a psychological state in which

socialized gender roles have negative consequences on the person or others. Gender role conflict occurs when rigid, sexist, or restrictive gender roles result in personal restrictions, devaluation, or violation of others or self (O'Neil, et al., 1995, O'Neil, 2008).
